


The People's Portrait A1+

There are lots of portraits of Queen Elizabeth II. But these two portraits are unique. Look carefully! They are composed of 5,000 photos of ordinary British people.

People sent in their images and short descriptions. Artist Helen Marshall assembled them into two portraits: the Queen at the time of her coronation in 1953, and then at the time of her Diamond Jubilee in 2012. The portraits are called The People's Monarch. You can see them at Gatwick Airport in London.
